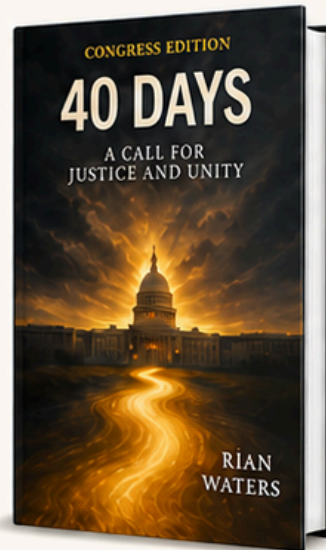
ABOUT THE CAMPAIGN

40 Days is launching its reform effort in Massachusetts and Florida as the first step toward a broader national campaign for more trustworthy courts.

The mission identifies common ways due process can break down and pairs them with practical reforms, alongside a biblical call to justice, truthful judgment, and protection for the vulnerable.

40 Days: A Call for Justice and Unity is a key resource for this mission. After the Massachusetts and Florida launch, the campaign intends to deliver the Congress Edition to every member of the U.S. Congress, giving lawmakers evidence of a systemic problem, the proposed reforms, and the moral reason this work matters.

WHY CHURCHES SHOULD CARE

Scripture repeatedly calls God's people to care about truthful judgment, justice for the vulnerable, and protection against oppression. Courts affect families, livelihoods, safety, reputations, and the ability of ordinary people to be heard. When due process breaks down, the consequences are not abstract — they are personal and often lasting. Amos 5 shows that systemic injustice is not merely a private failing, but a community sin. God rejects worship disconnected from justice and calls instead for justice to "roll down like waters."

A SIMPLE OPPORTUNITY TO HELP

THE CORE DUE PROCESS REFORMS



1

MINIMAL FINDINGS FOR KEY DENIALS

Justice must show its work.
Courts should briefly explain important decisions involving safety, witnesses, dismissal, sanctions, injunctions, or constitutional rights so they can be understood and meaningfully reviewed.

EXPEDITED REVIEW FOR PLAIN ERROR

Obvious errors should be corrected while correction still matters.
When a clear procedural error threatens rights or safety, there should be a narrow path to correct it before delay makes the harm permanent.

RIGHT TO REMEDY FOR JUDICIAL SYSTEM FAILURE

Rights without remedies are promises without protection.
Judges should remain protected in their role, but when serious constitutional harm goes uncorrected, there should be a system-level remedy.



WHY THESE REFORMS MATTER

- More transparent: People should be able to understand why important decisions were made.
- More correctable: Obvious high-impact errors should be fixed while correction still matters.
- More trustworthy: Serious constitutional harm should not leave people with no meaningful remedy.
- More protective of the vulnerable: Families, witnesses, and ordinary people should not be left defenseless when process fails.

These reforms strengthen the basic safeguards that make justice more reliable for all people.
